Fabric report

This has been a productive year on the fabric front, with plans now gathering momentum for the repair and redevelopment of our buildings. As always, there is a tension between remedial repairs and funding those, and the longer term redevelopment of the buildings, and the PCC continues to prayerfully discern this.

All Saints building:

- Annual tests have been conducted on the organ, clock, heating, PAT testing, gutters, fire checks
- Quinquennial Inspection is due to be undertaken in 2015
- Repairs to the clock have been approved including making safe the clock face. Replacement of the mechanism is deferred until funds become available.

St Helen's building:

- Annual tests have been conducted on heating, PAT testing, gutters, fire checks
- Quinquennial Inspection is due to be undertaken in 2015
- Dilapidations settlement received from the Diocese in the amount of £132,000.00
- Discussions with BT over legality of BT broadband box installation outside are ongoing

Planned remedial works and improvements funded by dilapidations funds include:

- Urgent QI items
- Secure storage solution
- Installation of a commercial dishwasher and heating cupboard
- Improvements to toilets
- Lighting Design
- Audio Visual equipment replacement and enhancement

A new website page and noticeboard at the back of All Saints have helped to raise awareness about the different mission partners and share their updates to us. Those who act as 'Champions' or links for the different international partners continue to play a vital role in helping the rest of the church to connect with and support the partners in appropriate ways.

It was great to be able to welcome the Schoonbees and for those who wanted to, to be able to meet over lunch to hear more about their work. During the Roes time back in the UK, it has and will be great to hear about their work in a variety of different settings.

There is an ongoing need to continue to develop this area of church life and there are lots of opportunities for those keen to support and encourage as well as learn from our mission partners. The hope going forward is that others will be able to get involved with Mission Support and that as a church we will continue to prayerfully consider our corporate giving and partnerships.

Worship Gatherings

(i) 10.30am Gathering

The 10.30am gathering continues to be the primary gathering context of much of our church family, although increasingly we see attendance overlap between the 10.30am and 6.30pm gatherings, particularly with students and young adults helping serve in the morning.

We have seen some move on to other churches or away from Worcester, and many others join us. The noticeable change in attendance patterns over the last few years, with people coming on average twice a month now, means there are some significant challenges to address on how to ensure people feel connected and integrated, and on how best to teach and invest in the community.

We have worked hard to make the most of the current pattern of gathering formats, which include All-Age, Communion and Celebrations. All-Age has changed hands from Carla Lavarack and Louise Harris to Rhi O'Rourke and we are experimenting with a slightly different approach to these gatherings. We have sought to create a range for formats for the Sundays we celebrate communion, with some more liturgical than others and seeking always to integrate communion well into the overall flow of the gathering.

We have enjoyed and appreciated some great guest speakers over the last 12 months, including James Lawrence (CPAS), Gavin Calver (YFC) and Caroline Phelps.

The worship team have grown significantly in the last 6-8 months and this has been most noticeable at the 10.30am gathering where our sung worship has been more consistent and of a higher standard.

The incredible effort of the Welcome Team and gathering hosts as well as the willingness of small groups to facilitate hospitality is hugely appreciated and vital!

(ii) 6.30pm Gathering

Sunday evening gatherings continue to punctuate the week in a special way as the St Helen's building plays host to a pleasingly mixed crowd; younger adults, retirees, YMCA residents, youth, students, off-duty parents, visitors, and curious wanderers have all regularly found their place among us.

The rhythm of worship spans a wide range from full liturgical communion services (complete with live-soundscape) to spacious 'soak' evenings, but somehow it all seems to hang together coherently, based around a strong sense of people meeting with God and each other.

Since September we've looked to further enhance the sense of people coming together by having an earlier start time and setting up the space sideways. Judging by the heckling that the more intimate set up seems to have afforded and the numbers joining the post-gathering pub trip each week, both efforts can be judged to have pulled us in the right direction.

The teaching echoes the morning gathering about half of the time, which leaves some space for the 6.30 gathering to do its own thing. In the autumn this was a series reading through Colossians, which heard the gospel invitation to live out lives "subverting the empire" and explored what it might mean for us to defy today's 'empire' of a globalised Western consumerism.

To this end, it must be happily noted that we enjoy a large core of 'non-consumers'. The whole gathering is made possible by all those committed to serving with host teams and in the band, etc. It's the homemade cakes, the smiling hosts stood outside in the cold, the innovative musicianship, the countless above and beyond, that make the 6.30 gathering a real treat to be a part of.

(iii) Thursday Gathering

The Thursday Parish Communion, which is celebrated at 10.30am in All Saints Church, is a weekly gathering with a Eucharistic focus using modern Common Worship liturgy. The fellowship of this gathering, meeting in a simple circle around the Lord's Table in the Chancel, is marked by many longstanding church friendships some spanning several decades of the life of All Saints. Whilst the Service is 'said' we do sing a hymn a cappella and the teaching programme follows the Lectionary readings for the day and the season. Prayer for healing with anointing and the laying on of hands is routinely offered and prophetic words of scripture are received for the strengthening of those facing illness and life's challenges. This group is especially marked by its prayerful support for one another and for those now frail and less able to venture out with safety and ease. Our God is a God of surprises, and one of the surprises of Thursday mornings is that 'strangers' see the North door open, the lights on and come in to join us ... the gentleman waiting for his car to be serviced ... the woman seeking the miraculous ... or the students on the building and construction course at the College, next door ... and the Dean from an American cathedral!

Operations

At the core of my role as Operations Manager is my desire is to facilitate people serving and ministering in their God given callings. This involves creating systems, coordinating events and regular activities and facilitating people engaging in mission and ministry and overseeing the upkeep and use of the buildings. In the past year this has expressed itself in the following.

Many people have continued to volunteer to join various teams to make events happen. This year we once again held a Bonfire and Fireworks Party at Top Barn Farm, which saw 300 people enjoying the evening together.

We have also been able to organise Gifts for Mothers Day, Fathers Day, enjoy a church lunch together and seen us decorating the church for special events such as Easter and Christmas. These have seen a team of creative volunteers engaging in cutting, sticking, wrapping, holding cellotape, encouraging, cleaning and making regular visits to the Worcester Recycling Centre. Thank you to everyone for the part you have played.

The Thank You Party was once again a time when we were able to express thanks to all who serve in ministry areas in the church. None of the above would have happened without the help of volunteers, whether their contribution was seen or unseen. I would like to thank everyone who has helped to make things happen in various ways.

Keeping All Saints and St Helen's clean and ready for use saw a change in staff this year. Veronica Andrews who previously served in the role of Cleaner was greatly missed and my heart felt thanks goes out to her for her commitment and attention to detail when she served in this role. Stella Power has now replaced Veronica and she has quickly settled into the role, which can be a repetitive and lonely job. Her commitment and attention to detail has enabled gatherings and groups to use the buildings to their full potential, and I want to thank her for all she has achieved in the short time she has been with us.

In November we were able to acknowledge and thank Christine Haig as she due to ill health saw her finish in her role as administrator. This was a big change for the office, as Christine has served in this role for 7.5 years. She has been greatly missed not only in terms of the job function she fulfilled but also for her sense of fun and laughter and I have missed my daily contact as a friend.

There has also been an increase in the use of the Church Centre as we have continued to realise and experience the versatility of the available spaces. Various groups have been enabled to meet. Weekly groups such as Tribe and Clan, Revive, Adventurers, and also courses such as CAP Money Course, Connect, Ministry Leaders Training Days and a Regional New Wine leaders day, Foodbank, to name but a few have been held.

The Centre also provides a working space for all the team, including Laura Tiffney and Tim O'Leary who joined as Interns last September along with

Philippa Barton who joined the team in February. We have been able to continue creating and developing administrative systems in the office to facilitate all the various aspects of ministry, and to coordinate all aspects of the various weekly gatherings.

Maintenance of the buildings and heating systems, keeping calendars up to date, planning and coordinating the terms events and adjusting to various situations and maintenance issues that unexpectedly arise week on week, are all part of the day to day tasks. This year I have appreciated all who have supported me by volunteering their time in severing in various roles. It has been an honour and a blessing to work with them. Thank you to you all!

Sound Team

We are looking forward to developing the PA facilities in St Helen's, with the possibility of adding some digital equipment and other possible improvements.

The musicians and PA team members have been faithful in their service and we appreciate their time commitment in preparation, setting up the equipment, rehearsing, and packing up. I want to say a big thank you to Andrea, Paul, Mark and Andy, the hard working and loyal team who have provided our PA Ministry over the past year.

Welcome Team

There is a fairly well known saying that it is everybody's job to be a welcomer in church, and in particular to help newcomers and visitors feel at home when they come into All Saints. While this is an important truth, it is also key that we have a dedicated group of folk who are committed to being that first contact point when people arrive in the building for the Morning Service. The 'Red Badge' Team are an amazing group of individuals who go out of their way to reach out to regulars and new alike.

The Welcome Team seems like a pretty good place to start in terms of getting to know more about life at All Saints, and quite a few people fairly new to the church have volunteered to help out with this ministry. It should never be a chore, but rather something that folk are willing to try out so that they can get to know others, and also find out about other aspects and opportunities for becoming involved. Some folk serve for a few months, while others love doing it so much it becomes a regular commitment.

Generally individuals will be 'on team' about once a month (more or less depending on their choice), though some enjoy welcoming so much that they are available far more frequently, which is a real blessing for all concerned.

We try to ensure that there are around 6 people available each week. This provides plenty of flexibility, so that if it doesn't suit a team member to be on duty on a particular week then it should never be problematic.

In the last few months there have been a number of comings and goings, with people getting involved in other ministries, moving on to other things or taking a break from the rota. There are currently around 30 people available to be on the Welcome Team, but there is always room for more! It is an important element of church life and we are incredibly blessed by, and grateful for, everyone who has been and is a part of the team - thank you to each one of you who has given of your time and yourself in this way.

Prayer

(i) SEEK

One-hundred and fifty-nine ePrayers were sent out in 2014 to about one-hundred and twenty email addresses many of whom worship at All Saints but also to others worshipping at other Worcester churches and beyond. This ministry not only addresses urgent pain and sorrow but also the joy and thanksgiving for answered prayer.

(iii) Prayer ministry

Children & Families work

(i) Children's Church

When I started the job of Children & Families worker in September 2014 I initiated a survey about what parents and children thought of the children's ministry we were offering at All Saints. Much of the feedback was very positive, with great appreciation for those that lead and run groups, and high praise for the people involved in All Age services and the monthly Children's Celebration. A common thread that ran through these surveys, however, was that there was a lack of continuity and cohesiveness, especially during our Sunday morning age groups.

As a result we decided to rebrand all of Children's Church, and have ended up with the following.

Adventurers (overarching name for all our Children's Ministry), made up of the following groups:

Scramblers (0–2's) – led by Joy & Tom Pollock, supported by Philippa Barton Explorers (3–5's) – led by Kath Johnson, Andy & Ruth Shepherd, Alice Pirrie, Rose Collins & Carla Lavarack

Discoverers (Years 1–2) – led by Zoe Silvester, Chris & Ivanna Giles, Steve O'Rourke, Laura Tiffney & Louise Tindall

Trailblazers (Years 3–5) – led by Anita & Kwesi Marles, Mark Seyler & Kate Rimell

Scramblers

Scramblers meet in the cabin, which is conveniently situated next to the loos and close to the church building. In the summer we make use of the courtyard space with water play and outside toys. In the cabin, we have endeavoured to provide a home like environment that is often commented on. Parents

appreciate the homely feel and are welcome to stay with their child although there is provision to leave them. We recognise that scramblers offers an opportunity to serve parents and carers as well as their children with real coffee and real conversation.

It offers a welcoming bridge into church for new people. There are often opportunities for conversation, prayer and support. We have radio link up so we can hear the service.

With the children, we offer free play, singing, snack time, age appropriate games and occasional seasonal crafts, for example, an Easter or valentine's card.

Our heart is to serve children and their parents to enable parents to enjoy the service and feel supported this season with pre school children. Our team provides overlap with the mainly music team which offers continuity. We signpost people to All Saint's from Mainly Music and people do respond.

Explorers, Discoverers & Trailblazers

We have trialled several ways of structuring these groups and their activities on a Sunday morning in the church centre, to learn what works best for our team and children, and are now settling into a good, consistent format.

The team meet for breakfast & prayer at 10am, this is an opportunity to give the morning to God, and to lift up in prayer any needs or concerns we may have as a team, as well as pray for our families.

The format of the morning was altered slightly to reflect some of the feedback from the surveys. We now gather together all the age groups at the start of the session, we then watch a DVD together from a series called 'Friends & Heroes', and then split off into age appropriate groups. The children then engage in material related to the DVD, it's a great opportunity for the children to explore faith, and gives them a chance to develop their own personal relationships with God.

We gather back at the end of the session for a time of prayer and worship. This has been such a valuable, during which we have seen kids actively engage in prayer for healing, meeting with the Holy Spirit and worshipping wholeheartedly. It has been very encouraging for me to witness and I'm very grateful to all who help with Adventurers for enabling Sunday mornings to run so well.

Another addition has been the introduction of T-shirts and Hoodies for our leaders. It's been a great way to show the families who are leading their sessions for that morning and it also creates an atmosphere of fun. We also wear lanyards with the logo of the group we are leading so that children know specifically who is leading their age group.

Children's Celebration

Children's Celebration meets on the 3rd Sunday of month and is for those children aged 3+. The team consists of Emma Pettifer, Ed and Mel Parsonage and Rhi O'Rourke. During each session we start off altogether with some worship and liturgy, then we hear the word of the day. We then split into 4 zones; prayer, craft, going deeper, games. Each group of children moves through each zone learning about going deeper in Christ so we can grow in Him more in our daily lives. We all come together again in worship and praying for each other, ending our session with a short piece of liturgy. We use different material for each celebration and this term we have been looking at hanging out with Jesus, doing "Experience Christmas" and now we are using "Experiencing God" through the Old Testament.

It has been brilliant seeing the youth helping lead: Nat Colthurst, Gabriel Ison, Asher and Judah Wood and Tim Burgess, along with Orianna Colthurst and Matilda Amess who have begun to help. They are increasingly confident leaders and have been leading different aspects of the Celebration, from the teaching to craft etc... They are fantastic at set up and take down and have fun with the children. It is brilliant seeing the young children develop their passion for leadership and be able to guide them in this with the help of the other leaders. They are very much a part of the team contributing to the planning as well.

(ii) Messy Church

Other exciting events that have happened in the life of Children's ministry this term have included:

Light Party

Lots of fun was had at this year's Light Party. We invited Christian magician Adrian Ward to come and entertain us, which he did with much success. We had a fantastic mixture of church kids and other children from our various outreaches such as Mainly Music and Messy Church. We were sad to lose Karen Nichol, a long-standing and valued team member, in July but also delighted to welcome three new members – Helen Knight, Jamie Knight & Jenny Prigg over the following months who, like the rest of the team, value highly the relationships we seek to establish with all those who attend and earnestly desire to see Jesus revealed through love in action.

Changes made last year to enrich the sessions such as the story time slot over snack time and the introduction of a drawing table continue to work well and add a richness to the sessions. We have also sought to create a sense of family at Mainly Music. This has seen us increase our celebration of birthdays by the giving of a small gift to each child, welcoming new babies & marking the departure of every child moving on from Mainly Music by giving them a bible & praying for them during the session.

We have also had great fun with some of the mothers and carers attending a Pimms & Planting evening as well as a cookery evening hosted by one of the mum's who attends Mainly Music. These evenings have added to the sense of relationship we seek to create.

We determine to look for opportunities to link who we are with our faith and our All Saints roots. We have continued to promote church courses and events such as The Parenting Course, Alpha and Christmas and Easter services both from the front and on our term card. We have also been hugely encouraged that our teapot, used to collect prayer requests which we introduced last year, is being used by those who attend & has been asked for when we have occasionally forgotten to put it out! We had a strong sense in December that each family should read the Christmas story for themselves and so gave a Christmas storybook to each child - which was well received. We are thrilled that several families have attended services and the Alpha Course at All Saints over the course of this year.

(ii) Revive

Revive is a women's group that serves a range, from students, mothers with babies and pre-school children, those who work, grandmothers and those who are retired - and everything in between. We thrive on being an intergenerational group and as a result there is a great deal of support, expertise, encouragement, experience, love, tears and laughter that is shared. Our format varies from term to term. We try to be responsive and reflective to the needs of the group and God's prompting. This term we have been encouraged to have the very gifted teacher and storyteller, Laura Gallacher takes us through a study of John's gospel. As well as teaching series we also have one off sessions like one on mentoring led by Paul Wilcox and one led my one of our Mission partners in Asia - sharing her experiences living and working there.

At the end of a term or teaching series we ask for feedback which often informs what we do next and helps us continually appraise how we shape each session. Whilst it's not done weekly we provide space for testimony and worship, soaking and reflections. Content covered has included 'Future Family' by Andy Stanley, a teaching series on the prodigal son by Paul Swann and Emotionally Healthy Women.

The format of the morning normally takes the form of coffee and refreshments before 10am. A prompt start (we try!) with content led from the front followed by break out groups to facilitate discussion and prayer. We aim to end promptly at 11.30 for those who have other commitments, although there is opportunity to stay beyond that time for further chat and coffee.

We offer crèche facilities in the adjoining room for all pre-school children.

Some words from one member of our group: I come to Revive...

- because I can previously working meant no daytime fellowship between Sundays
- fellowship and friendship with other women
- heart to heart discussion
- learning and remembering how much God cares about us through the word

I was leading a session on Mentoring for them and they were so responsive and enthusiastic. This is just the kind of opportunity that I love at All Saints. I had a very similar experience on the evening of Sunday 4 January when I was also speaking about Mentoring and basing my thoughts on Isaiah 54:3 where we read, 'All your children will have God for their teacher - what a mentor for your children!'

(http://www.allsaintsworcester.org.uk/talks/the-ancient-meets-the-contemporary-mentoring/) I called the talk 'The Ancient meets the Contemporary' because I believe that Mentoring is all about drawing on the past and learning from our experiences and Biblical examples, but also looking to the future and how we can keep in step with the Spirit, so that the grace of God will be maximised in our lives. I encourage you to have a listen if you are curious about what mentoring is all about, or if you need some fresh input!

Mentoring is a 'below the radar' aspect of life at All Saints, but it is extremely valuable and we encourage everyone to think about having one, not just people in recognised leadership. Jane and I are the people to speak to if you would like a mentor, but you don't know who to ask. There have been quite a few people over the last few weeks who have approached us and we are currently in the process of matching people up (I can't think of a better way of putting it).

Someone said recently that what folk need these days is not so much a 'sage on the stage, but a guide on the side'. I love that. What it means is that, whilst there is obviously a very important place for upfront preaching and teaching, there is an even more pressing need for someone to accompany us on the journey of life and provide encouragement and intentional accountability, which will actually help us to experience what it means to be a part of the Body of Christ, rather than simply know it as a concept in our heads.

Here are some comments from real life mentees at All Saints who have discovered the value of being mentored:

"Mentoring continues to be a brilliant way of intentionally journeying together in a way that encourages discipleship, honesty and community."

"Mentoring gives me an opportunity to refine the areas God is challenging me in, in a safe environment in which I can ask questions, make mistakes and deepen my relationship with Him."

"Mentoring is probably the most important and influential part of my discipleship. Although the amount of input seems small, it cuts to the heart of what really drives my life and actions, and provides me with the accountability and energy I need to keep pushing in and on. Mentoring is absolutely vital to my growth and for me to fulfil my calling."

"Mentoring is a great growth experience. It not only forges a lasting relationship between mentor and mentee, it helps to strengthen a persons relationship with the people around them. It is an on-going transformational commitment that can naturally lead to a blossoming and deepening culture. It's invaluable to me."

The feedback has been extremely positive and it has been a joy to see several people 'join in' with the life of our church as a result of the course.

These courses are wonderful ways of serving our communities and I look forward to seeing them run regularly in the future.

Worcester Foodbank

Worcester Foodbank is part of the Trussell Trust; we provide three days' emergency food (10 nutritionally balanced meals) is provided to men, women and children in crisis locally. People in need are able to access this food at our foodbank centre located at Carden Court. As well as receiving a food parcel, people will also have access to other services such as a listening ear, signposting to further support, and prayer. Other essential supplies provided to clients include toiletries, tin openers, cutlery, plates and cups. We have food donation drop off points at the foodbank centre, in Churches, in three Supermarkets and at the Guildhall.

The highlights since the project began in 2012 have been:

- Fed over 10,000 people since opening in June 2012 (one third are children)
- Given away over 80 tonnes of food, and collected over 100 tonnes
- During 2014-15 we fed 4,100 people with 34.5 tonnes of food
- Recruited, trained and supported 140+ volunteers who have given an estimated 6,500 voluntary hours they are amazing and we thank every one of them!
- Worked with 65 local agencies who help assess people in crisis and distribute Foodbank Vouchers
- Benefitted from the efforts of 105 partner organisations, plus countless individuals, that have collected and donated over 24 tonnes of food
- Developed working relationships with Worcester Warriors, Sainsbury's local store, the Guildhall, Worcester Police, and Worcester Volunteer Centre
- Foodbank regularly supports St Paul's Hostel, Maggs Day Centre, YMCA night shelter, Street Pastors, and the City Mission Soup Kitchen project
- Finances: raised £18K from local charities, churches and supporters, and received almost £4K from Trussell Trust in Tesco top up grants
- Success in bidding for pallet loads of toys and goodies
- Kept running costs down to £11K (budget £30K); budgets for manager's salary, warehouse equipment and food purchase not needed, leaving the accumulated fund of £27K. This represents an operational reserve of £16K, and £11K as a development reserve

Our future plans are:

- Volunteers including those with management skills are still required and a recruitment process is underway with 10 new volunteers in the pipeline

- The lease on the premises expires on 28th February 2015. A rolling monthly lease has been agreed while research is carried out to improve access and facilities
- The PCC is looking to develop the service to include clothing, interview clothing and haircuts, baby basics supplies, job club to assist people back into successful employment, internet cafe for job club and clients needing to research how to use their personal care budgets, and toys form Christmas project, and space for CAP.

Worcester CAP ("Christians Against Poverty")

This has been a year of change and transition for Worchester CAP. Saying Goodbye and heartfelt thanks to Ted & Ginny Duckett from All Saints and all those clients that they travelled alongside, and thanks for their initial vision and for getting it all started.

Saying Hello in June to Dave Christmas who has built on the foundations already laid by completing his CAP training and encouraging others to be more actively involved. Dave has seen 20 new clients of whom two have already become debt free and others progressing towards that goal. For 2015 there are already 7 new clients waiting to start the journey.

Due to the endeavours of Tim Joesbury-Clarke and his PR skills the profile of CAP has been increased in Worcester through regular relevant articles in the press.

Thanks go to Barry and John Collier for organising monthly prayer meetings (we would love to see you there) – the whole organisation is upheld powerfully in prayer.

Another new appointment is Mark Stone who will be responsible for organising client events and overseeing volunteers to support Dave on each visit, which is a requirement of CAP. If you have a few hours to spare Dave or Mark would like to chat with you about it.

Paul Harris and Guy Lavarack have continued to promote and run the CAP money course and the vision is to encourage clients to now be part of that.

Clients have been amazed and brought to tears that they have not had to pay for the debt support service and add to their debt problem. This has created many opportunities to pray with clients who have never been prayed for before and opened up many conversations about the Christian walk and why people should want to help. T

his is possible because of regularly giving to CAP by 'Livechangers' no amount is to small – please join us in our ministry in supporting and encouraging the vulnerable people we get to help.

CAP Money

In the year April 2014 to March 2015, All Saints has retained its two registered CAP Money Coaches, Guy Lavarack and Paul Harris. One course was successfully run in the period primarily for the benefit of the All Saints congregation.

The course was once again very well received and it is clear that it has the potential to significantly improve the lives of people struggling to manage their finances and to be an effective outreach tool for the Church.

The current plans are to run another course in the autumn of 2015, but this time targeted specifically at the student population within the All Saints congregation which will involve delivering a slightly more tailored course.

Longer-term plans are to; hold courses more frequently; to target people outside of the immediate All Saints congregation; and to potentially recruit more members of the congregation who would like to become CAP Money Coaches. The main limitations at present are 1) being able to resource courses held more frequently and 2) putting more thought and effort into the marketing campaign required to effectively recruit potential course participants from outside of the immediate Church congregation.

The potential of this ministry as an outreach tool is large and really it is up to the All Saints PCC and the designated Money Coaches to decide how ambitious we want to be or should be with it. The ministry goes hand in hand with the CAP Debt Centre and should be considered an essential outreach tool working alongside Foodbank and in time, a CAP Job Centre as the issues of employment, money and food are clearly all inter-linked. Therefore, in time there will be an integrated management approach within the church to the organising and running of all of these ministries.

Hope for Justice

In May last year we enjoyed our first fundraising event; a cheese and wine evening held in St Helen's. The evening was very enjoyable with top-notch cheese supplied by Top Barn and wines from the local Rose Bank vineyard. This was a great opportunity for the church to rally and re-assert ourselves in the cause of ending human trafficking. The event was even more exciting as it fell on the same week that Hope for Justice opened their second regional investigation and rescue hub, which (in part thanks to our lobbying work since 2012) covers West Mercia. Hope for Justice is a charity which rescues people caught in human trafficking, and now, having joined with two other organisations to create a world-wide model for combating human trafficking, also rehabilitates survivors.

Most of our work is in support of Hope for Justice, and our year is marked by their annual Hope conference, which a group from All Saints attended in November. This was a great weekend, perhaps surprisingly given the subject matter, but the whole event is marked by hope in God's work to not only to rescue, but truly restore and renew survivors of trafficking, and a sense that we are joining in His mission, rather than striving alone.

For the first time we met late last year to jointly develop a long-term strategy for our group. Since forming in 2012, we have understood that our operations have had to be somewhat limited, as there has not been an effective policing response to human trafficking in our region. For us to activate front line agencies too soon could be counterproductive. However, with the opening of the new regional investigation hub covering our area, this situation has changed. We asked Hope for Justice's Operations Director whether we should now push on generating awareness and delivering training, and he said "go". We intend to.

As such, in the coming year we are planning several areas of work to position ourselves amongst professional organisations working directly against, or coming into contact with, human trafficking. Hope for Justice are considering developing training packages which we could deliver, our aim is to have an established network of professional relationships in place when this becomes available. Our strategic aim is to make Worcestershire a hostile environment for human trafficking.

In May we plan to organise a sponsored walk (with distances to suit all abilities and stride lengths!) to raise money for Hope for Justice. This promises to be good fun for all so please get involved! Also, please pray.

Worcester City Centre Chaplaincy

The Worcester City Centre Chaplaincy is an ecumenical workplace chaplaincy under the umbrella of Faith at Work in Worcestershire (http://www.faithatwork.org.uk/). At the present, the Chaplains are drawn from St Andrew's Methodist Church, Worcester, St Stephen's, Barbourne, and All Saints. The Team is presently led by The Rev'd Dick Johnson, Industrial Chaplain serving Faith at Work in Worcestershire.

The Chaplaincy serves the 'daytime' aspects of the church's ministry to the economy and daily life in Worcester City Centre. This ministry seeks to bring Christ-centred values of love and concern for justice principally to the retail sector and to inform the church so that it can respond prophetically, prayerfully and practically. The retail business environment varies year by year and whilst some shops prosper, in most of our regular prayerful conversations with staff, shop managers and proprietors we hear of pressure to meet harder sales objectives. Several businesses are all too aware that they live on the edge of a financial precipice. Some staff are employed on zero-hours contracts with little prospect of terms of permanent employment. Many look back wistfully to when a city centre High Street environment was the 'go to' location, rather than losing customers to the prospect of another green-field, out-of-town site competing with better parking and accessibility. And retail premises continue to seek how to engage with the ease and attractiveness of e-buying.

Chaplaincy is mission through pastoral ministry. Chaplains hear the life experiences, both positive and less so, of those working in retail, so many of whom gain great fulfilment in their work of serving customers. Of course, we pray for them, and at times, are honoured to pray with them on the shop floor or as they take a moment from clearing tables in their café. As Chaplains, we endeavour to help retail staff find that God is present in their lives and daily work—ours in an immense privilege to be alongside people as they make these discoveries. For us, the discovery is to encounter with them the Kingdom of God, the God who often was long at work before we arrived on the scene!

The Chaplaincy's original work started in Cathedral Plaza, much of which is awaiting redevelopment and will take on a new commercial emphasis as some businesses close or move. We will continue to serve that area as well as New Street, Friar Street, parts of the High Street and CrownGate and making introductory calls on new shops as they open. The trend towards shopping malls has led to the privatisation of public space; nevertheless we are so very appreciative of those who quietly enable this ministry: the

commercial centre managers, their security teams and the many others who give their wisdom, encouragement and support.

The City Centre Chaplaincy is always listening for others interested to explore whether God is calling them to this ministry.
